

The Small Wins Matter




MONARCHY:

- Principle form of government
- Power went from king to their sons
- Kings were treated as gods
- They enjoyed a large amount of power
- Commoners could not speak to them
- Property in the kingdom belongs to the king
- King was considered divine and god-like

PROVINCIAL AND LOCAL ADMINISTRATION:

- 1. PROVINCIAL ADMINISTRATION:
 - Central Gupta empire was divided into provinces (each of them were supervised by upasaka)
 - Provinces were divided into villages (supervised by gramapal)
 - Other units: city, market, village
- 2. LOCAL ADMINISTRATION:
 - Principals: gramapal, market chief, village head
 - Divided into small towns called villages
- 3. TOWN ADMINISTRATION:
 - Towns ('gauplas') - owned lands and taxes
 - They were administered by gramapal
 - Separate officials and revenue guides were made

- System of administration underwent several changes
- It was based on centralized model
- Devolution of state authority
- Control of state, regulation of agriculture
