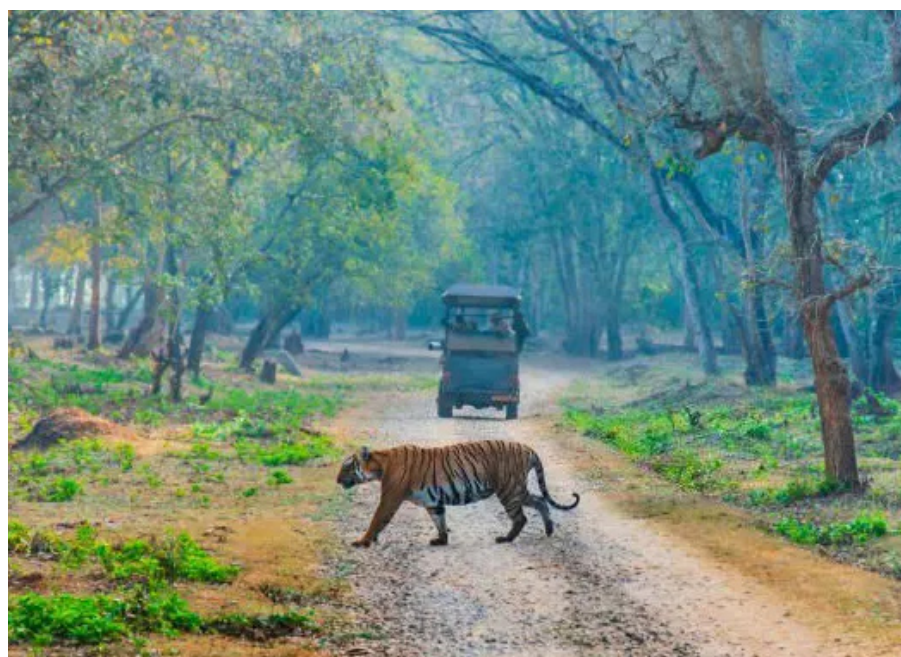
Final Year Retreat

Emotional

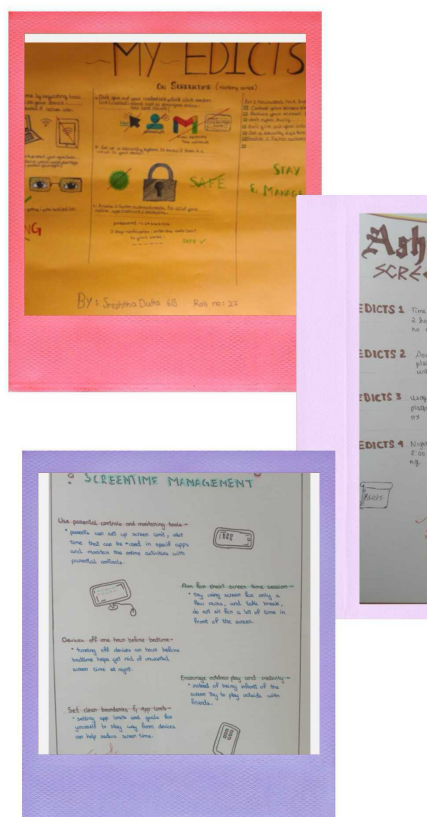
- Does the activity help children express feelings or build confidence?

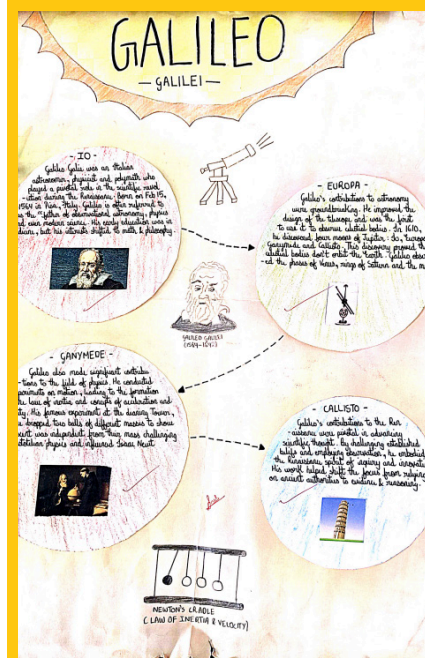
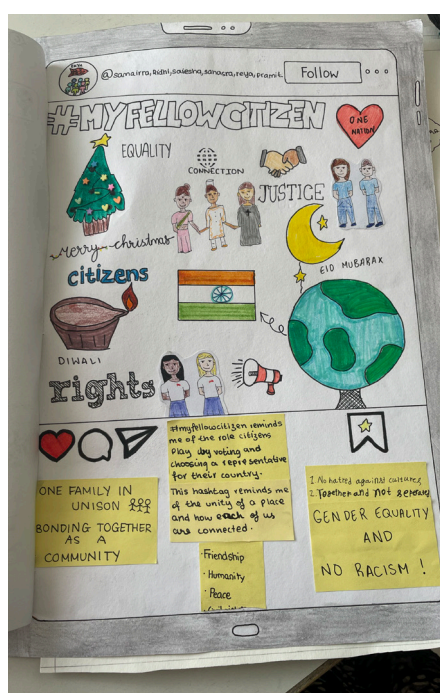
LEARNING & INSIGHTS

Ekya's Social Science curriculum fosters critical thinking, creativity, and real-world connections through experiential and collaborative learning. Activities like designing **modern edicts**, **exploring Renaissance themes through descriptive posters**, and **analysing citizenship concepts** encourage inquiry, teamwork, and hands-on engagement. This approach ensures students develop essential skills while connecting historical and cultural knowledge to contemporary contexts.



As part of the Grade VII unit on the **Idea of Citizenship**, students engaged in a hands-on activity to explore civic responsibilities and community engagement. Through creative projects, they expressed their understanding of citizenship, focusing on concepts such as **rights**, **duties**, and **societal contributions**. This activity encouraged students to think critically about their role in society, fostering values of empathy, responsibility, and active participation. Ekya Schools' pedagogy continues to inspire students to connect classroom learning with real-world applications.

Grade VI students engaged in a unique, authentic task inspired by the **Mauryan Empire's Ashokan Edicts**. As the "Head of School," students created modern edicts to promote discipline and responsible digital time usage at home and school. Through creative mediums like scrolls, chart papers, and visually engaging designs, students developed practical solutions on topics such as **screen time limits, PE hours, and class schedules**. This hands-on activity not only fostered creativity and collaboration but also encouraged critical thinking and the application of historical practices to modern challenges. A testament to Ekya's commitment to experiential learning.



As part of the Grade VIII unit Italy: Birthplace of the **Renaissance**, students engaged in a collaborative group activity to research and present significant developments of the Renaissance. Topics such as **Galileo's contributions, the impact of the printing press, and the rivalry between Venice and Genoa** were explored through descriptive posters and guided questions. This interactive approach encouraged teamwork, critical thinking, and a deeper understanding of the Renaissance's lasting influence on the world. Ekya's pedagogy seamlessly blends creativity with inquiry-based learning.

Hyderabad's Kancha Gachibowli Forest Destruction



In Hyderabad, the Kancha Gachibowli forest is being destroyed. This forest was home to many species of animals and birds, and most importantly, home to the **Peacocks, the national bird of our country**. This is a very big concern, and we should raise our voices. This incident occurred at night, and over **400+ acres** of land were destroyed by 50 bulldozers. Peacocks and deer were heard crying, and many people were found protesting to stop cutting down the trees. If deforestation continues across India, then we could face potential issues like **less oxygen, temperature rise, animals losing their habitats**, and also **an extreme downfall in India's biodiversity**.

This forest is being cut down for the construction of IT Parks and also to extend the University of Hyderabad [Uoh]. This forest should not have been cut down as it was known as India's **biodiversity hotspot, environmental stabiliser, and community asset**, and was also home to **743 plant species and over 220 bird species**, including some **highly rare species**. Last but not least, more people should be aware of the damage deforestation causes to both us and animals, and if it is not stopped, then many animals can go **extinct** and cause **environmental imbalance**.

The Importance of Reading Different Genres for Students

"A reader lives a thousand lives before he dies . . . The man who never reads lives only one." – George R.R. Martin

When students explore books beyond their comfort zones, they don't just read—they discover. While it's natural to have a favourite genre—whether it's fantasy, mystery, or graphic novels—reading across genres enriches the learning journey in countless ways.

Different genres offer different windows into life.

Historical fiction brings the past to life.

Science fiction stretches the imagination toward future possibilities.

Biographies allow students to walk in someone else's shoes.

Mystery novels sharpen sequencing and detail-oriented thinking.

Non-fiction strengthens factual comprehension and critical inquiry.

Realistic fiction and drama present relatable characters and situations, helping students process emotions and social dynamics.

Fantasy, on the other hand, provides hope, wonder, and the magic of escape.

Monotony can kill a reading habit. Introducing students to a variety of genres keeps reading fresh and exciting. A student who loves adventure might discover a surprising love for graphic novels or poetry when given the chance.

How Our Students Are Exploring Genres

When students are encouraged to read different genres, it sparks their creativity, fuels their imagination, and broadens their thinking. They begin to experiment with writing from different perspectives, which naturally enhances their writing skills. Exposure to a variety of genres also builds their confidence to express ideas in new ways. At our school, the **Love to Read** program actively nurtures this growth by encouraging students to explore diverse genres and reflect on their reading through meaningful, hands-on activities.

Here's a glimpse of how themes and genres have come alive through their creativity:

When we had **Earth** as the theme, Students wrote imaginative stories about objects that have evolved over time. From toothbrushes and aeroplanes to coins and huts, their tales featured delightful characters like **Mr. Paper**, **The Book**, and **The Humble Hut**. Pens and Books emerged as favourites, showcasing both creativity and thoughtful research.

Under **Wellness & Wisdom**, Students confidently recommended book titles focused on emotional well-being, mindfulness, self-care, and friendship. Their suggestions reflected a mature understanding of the genre and its importance.

During our **India**-themed reading month, in collaborative groups, students created vibrant booklets highlighting India's rich culture,

geography, freedom struggle, and technological achievements. Their work blended fiction, nonfiction, and folk literature, creating a meaningful learning experience.

Under the **Art** theme, students let their imagination run wild with the activity "**Dear Colour**", where they wrote heartfelt letters to colours, expressing the emotions colours might go through. It was a brilliant fusion of emotion, creativity, and visual thinking.

When the theme was **Kindness and Compassion**, students reflected on their favourite characters and wrote about how those characters demonstrated compassion. This led to some very insightful observations and helped students connect stories with real-life values.

The goal isn't to make every student fall in love with every genre, but to offer them the freedom and encouragement to explore. Just like a balanced diet nourishes the body, a wide literary palette nourishes the mind and spirit.

Through programs like **Love to Read**, our students are not just reading more—they're reading **wider**, becoming **informed**, **imaginative**, **empathetic** individuals who are ready to face the world with open minds and open hearts.
